City Manager Mark Skiles introduced the three member panel for the purpose of the discussion regarding a reverse osmosis water treatment plant and injection well. Saba Tahmassebi, Chief Engineer for the Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality, Brian Meiers of Burns & McDonnell and Councilman Don Rodolph, moderator.

Brian Meiers introduced Jake White and Rob Stallings of Burns & McDonnell also. He showed a power point presentation that consisted of the map of the planned pipeline from the golf course to the proposed reverse osmosis treatment plant.

Councilman Rodolph said that the City is looking at acquiring an existing gas well and if this is accomplished there would not be a need for an injection well.

Mr. Tahmassebi addressed the question regarding potential earthquakes. He said that Clinton is in an area that is less likely to experience earthquakes.

Panel members presented information and answered questions from the audience.
